Voting options depend on whether the member is a residential member or non-individual entity.

The Golden West Board of Directors voted to allow additional voting options for the 2024 directors election. The change was made possible by amendments to the organization's articles and bylaws that members approved in recent years.

As a result, this year residential members can vote in advance of the meeting online or by mail. Non-individual entity members (see page 6) have the option to vote before the meeting by mail. Members who do not vote in advance may vote in person at the annual meeting.

Residential members

Residential members include both single and joint memberships.

Here's how to vote starting August 12:

- Vote online. Watch your mail for a letter coming the week of Aug. 12 with instructions for voting. To vote electronically, members will be authenticated by entering the last four digits of the primary account holder's social security number. The primary account holder is the person whose name appears first in the member name. Only residential members with a social security number previously provided to Golden West may vote online.
- Request a paper ballot to vote by mail. Contact Golden West between Aug. 12 and Sept. 10, 2024, to request a paper ballot be mailed to you. Complete the ballot and return it in the postage paid envelope provided. Be sure to allow enough mail time, so it arrives by Sept. 24.
- Vote in person at the annual meeting. Any residential member who has not voted in advance may cast a ballot at the meeting. The meeting will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 28, at the community center in Wall.

All ballots cast in advance either electronically or by mail must be received by Tuesday, Sept. 24, to be counted.

Non-individual entity voting

Non-individual entities include businesses, churches, school districts, towns, etc.

Non-individual members must request an Authorization to Vote form from Golden West, complete the form, and return it to the cooperative. To vote by mail, the form must be returned by Tuesday, Sept. 10. To vote at the annual meeting, the form must be returned by 2 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 24. Voting authorization forms received after the deadline or presented the day of the Annual Meeting will not be accepted.

Each non-individual entity shall designate a representative who is an officer, an LLC member, or other senior official with their organization to vote by mail or in person at the annual meeting. The Authorization to Vote form is not a Proxy Statement.

Keeping the election secure, accurate

The cooperative is working with Survey & Ballot Systems (SBS) to manage voting before this year's meeting. SBS provides dependable and secure voting systems for many types of organizations, including cooperatives.

SBS will provide Golden West with certified election results from the electronic and mail-in ballots. Those votes will be combined with ballots cast at the annual meeting for a final count. A three-member balloting committee appointed by the Board of Directors supervises all ballot counting at the annual meeting.



olden West is not raising cable TV rates for increased profits. Rather, to continue providing video service and maintain fair practices for all members, the cooperative must pass along the cable TV increases it incurs.

Unfortunately, video customers will see a \$4.00 per month increase for cable TV programming beginning in August. Let's take a closer look at the forces behind these rising rates.

Programming and retransmission fees

Owners of cable TV channels like TBS, Discovery, Disney, ESPN, and more charge **PROGRAMMING FEES** for Golden West to carry their channel. Larger companies continually buy more channels; today six or seven companies own almost all the channels.

This leads to more demands and fewer options, which translates to higher rates. For example, these companies require Golden West to carry and pay for ALL of their channels – not just the one or two channels that are most widely watched.

Golden West regularly reviews its programming costs. While this can lead to increased rates for customers, it does not improve the cooperative's margins.

In addition to cable TV channels, Golden West passes along charges from affiliate broadcast stations (local ABC, CBS, NBC, and FOX stations). These stations charge **RETRANSMISSION CONSENT FEES** for passing, or transmitting, their signal to cable and satellite customers for over-the-air programming. If their demands aren't met, each broadcaster can force the removal of their station from the lineup when agreements expire.

Retransmission fees go directly to the affiliate broadcasters and their out-of-state corporate owners. Golden West does not keep one cent of retransmission fees. Like ownership of cable TV channels, several national media conglomerates operate most affiliate broadcasters, including many stations in South Dakota.

Aren't the airwaves public?

Broadcasters use public airwaves at no cost, so local channels are broadcast for free. However, rural residents often live too far from a transmitter to receive reliable signals with an antenna. Due to outdated regulations, Golden West is required to include local broadcast channels - which come with retransmission consent fees in every cable TV service offering.

Rural customers rely on cable TV to receive local news, weather, and sports. Still, the affiliate broadcasters choose to exploit and profit from people who want or need to receive local channels via cable or satellite TV.

Retransmission consent fees first appeared as a small, seemly insignificant charge in 2009. The Federal Communications Commission requires rate renegotiations, which has led to costs rising exponentially every year since.

Other telecommunications cooperatives in South Dakota have discontinued cable TV due in large part to rising costs. Golden West appreciates your business and your understanding as we plan to continue to bring you quality cable TV programming you enjoy – even as charges increase. PRESORTED
