For nearly 70 years, the Mensch family in Avon has helped color the world for locals and thousands of people in the surrounding five-state area with high-quality plants.

e try and grow the best quality," Lyle Mensch says. "It almost has to be perfect."

Lyle and his son Korey Mensch grow vegetables, flower baskets, and plants at Mensch Greenhouse on the southwest edge of Avon, specializing in petunias and geraniums. They sell their products wholesale to thousands of customers through more than 120 independent retailers in South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, and Wyoming.

The father-son duo also supplies the Mensch Retail Greenhouse & Flower Shop with what they need to make and sell floral arrangements directly to customers. Lyle's niece Carol Tolsma and her husband Vern run it on the other side of Avon.

"It's nice, because we just put our flowers onto the back of the flat bed and bring them across town," she says.

A separate retail location helps

differentiate between retail and wholesale. Carol says. This allows her to provide a more focused and personalized experience for her customers.

Ada Mensch opened her own greenhouse in Avon in 1957. Her son Lyle joined her a decade later, and 2024 is his 57th year with Mensch Greenhouse. Ada's granddaughter Carol and her husband Vern have also spent decades in the family greenhouse business. The Mensch family members have well over 100 years of greenhouse and floral experience combined.

### **Deep community roots**

The family supports Avon and the surrounding communities, as well. Lyle and Korey take care of the plants on Avon's Main Street. They also maintain a community garden where locals can harvest fresh produce and contribute to local schools and projects in different towns.

Carol and Vern have a garden, too, growing all types of produce over two acres. They preserve their harvest by canning and even make wine, and they offer their fresh and canned goods to locals through their retail business. In addition, the couple commemorates countless community milestones such as weddings, anniversaries, and funerals with their local deliveries of floral arrangements.

The Mensch family all appreciate their hometown of Avon. "We've always lived here," Carol says. "I couldn't think of being anywhere else."

Lyle and Korey say technology has made their entire business expansion easier. As Golden West customers, they've also adapted to a digital approach.

"The whole business is on a handheld phone," Lyle says. "We couldn't operate without Golden West services."

Safety is in your hands. Every dig. Every time.

As summer starts this year, you might be raring to get to your project list. Before you do, make sure you call 811 or visit sdonecall.com. Here's why you should call or click before you dig:

- It is the law. By law, everyone must notify 811 at least two business days before any digging. After providing a bit of information, utility companies will send someone to locate underground lines. Once all utility lines are marked, you can safely complete your summer projects that requiring digging.
- Calling 811 prevents outages. Damaged utility lines can disrupt your service or that of your neighbor. Even worse, damaged utility line repairs might cause unexpected outages throughout the whole neighborhood or beyond.
- You save yourself pain. Accidentally damaging the wrong utility line could potentially cause personal injuries. Save yourself the pain and call 811 before you get your shovel out.

At **sdonecall.com**, you can enter a form online before you plan to do any digging. By notifying South Dakota 811 at least two business days ahead of time, you can save yourself time and money.

- Community education classes might also be offered in your area! With many universities and community centers across the state, even a quick search can locate nearby community education courses.

# VOTING OPTIONS ADDED = for 2024 annual meeting ==

here are many reasons to attend the 72nd Annual Meeting of the Golden West Telecommunications Cooperative on Sept. 28. You can learn more about the cooperative, and you'll get complimentary lunch and other goodies. You can enjoy a fall visit to Wall and the neighboring Badlands and Black Hills, as well.

In the past you also had to attend the annual meeting to vote in director elections and on any other cooperative business. That's changed this year as now members can vote electronically online or by mail in advance, as well as in-person during the meeting in Wall.

### More members can participate

"Golden West looks forward to giving more members the opportunity to participate in co-op business by voting from the comforts of their home or business," says Golden West General Manager and CEO Denny Law.

"The co-op proudly serves members from Edgemont in the southwest to Trent in the east and most places in between. While a trip to Wall in the fall may be nice, it isn't feasible for everyone," Law says.

The Golden West Board of Directors voted to make this change following amendments to the organization's articles and bylaws that members approved in recent years. The cooperative is working with Survey & Ballot Systems (SBS) to manage this year's hybrid voting options. SBS provides dependable and secure voting systems for many types of organizations, including cooperatives.

### **Election and voting timeline changes**

The move to multiple voting options requires a new timeline for director elections. The notice of vacancy will be published in newspapers and mailed to members in 72nd Annual

affected districts during the second half of May. The last day to file a nominating petition is June 28.

If there are two or more valid candidates for the same open seat, voting in the required election will begin mid-August. At that time Golden West will mail members instructions for voting electronically online. Those who prefer to vote by mail must request a paper ballot.

### Vote online or by mail before meeting

Golden West will include the member's Golden West member number in the letter detailing online voting instructions. For validation, online voters must enter their member number and the last four digits of the social security number, which must match what Golden West has on file. Non-individual entities will enter the last four digits of their tax identification number or TIN.

Ballots must be received by Sept. 24 either electronically or by mail to be counted. SBS will provide Golden West with certified election results from the electronic and mail-in ballots.

### In-person voting at the annual meeting

To maintain the integrity of Golden West's one vote per member rule, only members who did not vote in advance will receive an authorization to vote slip at the annual meeting. Non-individual entities must follow the authorization to vote

process in advance to vote in person at the meeting. Vote totals from in-person voting at the meeting on Sept. 28 will be combined with the electronic and paper mail-in by request vote totals to determine the final results.
